<u>Presbyterian Church (USA) formally recognizes same-sex marriage in their constitution</u>. On March 17th, after a majority vote of the churches regional bodies, the Presbyterian Church became the largest Protestant denomination in the country to formally recognize same-sex marriage by making an amendment to its constitution defining marriage as "a unique commitment between two people". Due to tensions between different factions of the church, the amendment states that marriage "traditionally" occurs "between a man and a woman".

New York St. Patrick's Day Parade criticized for not being LGBTQ-i nclusive enough. Though one LGBTQ organization (Out@NBCUniversal) marched in the parade on March 17th, many, including Mayor Bill de Blasio, do not feel the parade has made enough inclusive change. Irish Queers, an advocacy group of LGBTQ Irish-Americans, also applied to march in the parade, but never received a response from parade organizers. Two men were arrested for throwing toilet paper at Out@NBCUniversal during the parade.

LGBT groups march in Boston's St. Patrick's Day Parade for the first time on March 15th. OUTVETS, a group of LGBT veterans, and Boston Pride historically marched. Mayor Marty Walsh also marched, making him Boston's first mayor to participate in the parade in 20 years. The late former Mayor, Tom Menino, refused to march due to the long-standing former discriminatory exclusion of LGBT organizations.

Reform Judaism's rabbinical arm installs first openly gay president, leading the Central Conference of American Rabbis. Rabbi Denise Eger was historically installed into this position on March 16th. Her rise, which she says shows the arc of civil rights, reflects the path of inclusion of same-sex marriage and openly trans people that Reform Judaism has. It seems like light years between today and when she began a gay and lesbian student group in 1980 but held meetings in another borough of New York than where people lived. Reform Judaism is the largest American Judaism movement.

MODERNIZING THE PROCESS FOR UPDATING IDENTITY DOCUMENTS

Late last year, **Rhode Island** adopted new vital records regulations to allow transgender people to obtain accurate gender designations on their birth certificates without requiring gender affirmation surgery. The change brings Rhode Island in line with contemporary professional standards of care along with the best practices of six other states and several federal agencies. **Massachusetts** and **New Hampshire** have also made recent changes to the process for updating gender designations on birth certificates and drivers licenses, respectively, and GLAD is working with advocates in **Connecticut** to propose modernizing the process for amending birth certificates there.

FIGHTING WORKPLACE DISCRIMINATION AT WALMART

GLAD is representing Jackie Cote in her fight to demonstrate that her employer, Walmart, discriminated against her because she is a woman married to another woman, when they refused to let her put her wife, Diana, on her health insurance. Diana is currently battling ovarian cancer and the couple have accumulated more than \$100,000 in medical bills. In late January, the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission issued a notice of probable cause indicating that Walmart's refusal to allow Jackie to include Diana on her health insurance did constitute discrimination on the basis of sex, and the case is moving forward.



• Yesterday evening (April 8) President Obama condemned the practice known as "conversion" or "reparative" therapy for the medical and psychological harm it causes to LGBTQ youth. Obama's statement referenced Leelah Alcorn, the 17-year-old transgender girl from Ohio who committed suicide last December after being subjected to years of reparative therapy by parents who did not accept her female gender identity.

• We're applauding the White House for their efforts to make bathrooms accessible to everyone, including trans and gender non-conforming people. The Task Force's Trans Civil Rights Program, directed by Kylar Broadus, worked directly with the White House to implement their first gender-neutral bathroom. President Barack Obama's



staff and visitors now have the option of using a gender-neutral restroom, a White House spokesman said Wednesday — the latest in a series of symbolic steps the Obama administration has taken...

• VICTORY! The Florida State Senate has nixed anti-LGBTQ discriminatory language from an adoption bill. Using faith as an excuse to denigrate loving same-sex parents is not about religious liberty--it's about legitimizing prejudice to justify discrimination, and we won't let it stand, in Florida or anywhere.

BISEXUALS HOPEFUL AS 1 OF THEIR OWN POISED TO LEAD

NEW YORK – "LGBT" has become a household term amid sweeping advances for gay rights, and yet the "B" sometimes seems like an awkward fit. The sudden advent of America's first openly bisexual governor may provide a chance to ease the awkwardness and broaden understanding of the bi community.

Kate Brown, Oregon's secretary of state, is in line to replace Democratic Gov. John Kitzhaber when he steps down ... amid an ethics scandal. Brown, serving her second term, lives in Portland with her husband and two step-children and has been open throughout her political career as being bisexual. Her progress has been followed closely by bisexual activists across the country, including Ellyn Ruthstrom, who now serves on the board of the Boston-based Bisexual Resource Center after 10 years as its president. "There are so few bi political leaders out there, so we pay attention to them," said Ruthstrom, citing Rep. Krysten Sinema, D-Ariz., as the other prominent example.

Gary Gates, a demographer at the UCLA School of Law's Williams Institute, estimated in 2011 that about 1.8 percent of the adult population, or a little more than 4 million Americans, identifies as bisexual – slightly more than the number identifying as gay or lesbian.

A vice president of one of the largest LGBT-rights groups, Fred Sainz of the Human Rights Campaign, said bisexuals may in some respects face greater challenges than gays and lesbians. "To the extent that they're out, they may well be more so the victims of scorn because they get it from both gay and straight people," Sainz said.

Kate Brown, after entering politics in 1991 as a member of Oregon's House of Representatives, wrote an essay about what it was like for her to come out as bisexual to her parents, her gay and straight friends, and her fellow lawmakers. Her parents' response: "It would be much easier for us if you were a lesbian." "Some days I feel like I have a foot in both worlds, yet never really belonging to either," she concluded.

IMPRESSIONS FROM THE DIANE SAWYER INTERVIEW WITH BRUCE JENNER

D: Are you a woman?

B: "...for all intents and purposes, I am a woman." "No, I am not gay. I am, as far as I know, a heterosexual." "In my heart and my soul, and everything I do in life is part of me - that female side is a part of me." Bruce stated that he has always been confused about his gender identity since he was very little. He said he secretly tried on his mother's dresses and didn't know why that felt so good. He said, "Bruce lives a lie, 'she' is not a lie." "...I cannot do it anymore. ...It is not that I am trying to dress like a woman, it's that my whole life I have been dressing as a man."

Thank you to Diane Sawyer for this interview, and thank you to Bruce for his honesty and for giving us insight into his life and for bringing transgender issues out and into the light.


